Instructions for authors

1. The author(s) transfer(s) the copyright to their article to Springer-Verlag, effective if and when the article is accepted for publication. The copyright covers the exclusive and unlimited rights to reproduce and distribute the article in any form (printing, electronic media or other); it also covers translation rights for all languages and countries. For U.S. authors the copyright is transferred to the extent transferable.

Manuscripts must be written in English.

Please submit manuscripts in triplicate, typed double-spaced; (printed on only one side of the sheet) with one set of original illustrations. **Manuscripts must be accompanied by the "Copyright Transfer Statement" (the form is regularly published in this journal).** **Short notes** must not exceed 6 manuscript pages ca. 26 880 characters (plus 1 table, 1 illustration and legend) and should be accompanied by a brief explanation of their novelty and significance.

Rejected manuscripts will be returned to the authors only if they contain important original comments from the referees, unless specifically requested by the authors. Original illustrations will always be returned.

Manuscripts in electronic form. Authors are strongly encouraged to send the final version of their manuscript – after acceptance for publication – in electronic form. Please follow the special technical instructions as printed in most issues of this journal.

2. The **title page** should include:

- name(s) of author(s)
- title of paper
- affiliation(s)
- any footnotes referring to the title
- address for correspondence

To facilitate communication, between the authors, editors and publisher, the author(s) should also furnish a fax number and e-mail address on this page.

3. The material must be arranged as follows:

- Abstract
- Key words (up to 5)
- Introduction
- Materials and methods
- Results
- Discussion
- Acknowledgement(s)
- References
- Tables
- Figure legends

For details of presentation, a recent issue of the journal should be consulted.

4. **Footnotes** to the title of the paper appear without a symbol; those to the text are numbered consecutively: footnotes to tables should be with lowercase letters, except those referring to statistical values, where asterisks are used.

5. **Genus and species** names should be in italics. Authorities must be given for all cultures, strains or isolates used in the published work and these should be identified by a culture collection number for use by others.

6. **Symbols** should be used consistently in figures, tables and text (lowercase or capital letters, arabic or roman numerals).

7. **Tables** must be numbered consecutively with arabic numerals and submitted separately from the text at the end of the paper. Each table should have a short title.

8. **Statistical analyses** of data should be given, with the test of significance used and the estimate of probability.

9. **References.** Only work that is cited in the text and that has been accepted for publication should be listed at the end of the paper in alphabetical order under the first author's name. Papers by two authors should be listed alphabetically according to the second author's name. Publications by three or more authors should be listed chronologically. If there is more than one work by the same author or team of authors in the same year, a, b, c, etc. is added to the year both in the text and in the list of references.

References should be cited in the text as follows:

"Marks and Kozlowski (1973)" or "(Harley 1984)." If there are more than two authors, only the first should be named, followed by "et al."

10. **Illustrations** must be restricted to the minimum needed to clarify the text. Previously published illustrations are usually not

accepted. Data given in graphs or tables should not be repeated in the text. All figures, whether photographs, graphs, or diagrams, must be mentioned in the text, and the top of the figure, the title of the paper, the author's name, and the figure number should be marked lightly on the reverse side in soft pencil. All figures are to be numbered consecutively throughout and submitted separately. The figures should match either the column width (8.6 cm) or the printing area (17.6×23.6 cm). Whenever possible, several figures should be grouped into a plate.

Illustrations prepared in digital form must be in accordance with the technical instructions for manuscripts and illustrations in electronic form that are published in this journal.

10.1 *Line drawings.* High-quality prints or good originals should be submitted. The inscriptions should be clearly legible. Letters 2 mm high are recommended. Computer drawings are acceptable provided they are of comparable quality to line drawings. Computer-drawn lines and curves must be smooth.

10.2 *Half-tone illustrations.* Sharp, well-contrasted photographic prints trimmed at right angles and in the desired final size should be submitted. If reduction is absolutely necessary, the scale desired should be indicated. The publisher reserves the right to reduce or enlarge illustrations.

10.3 For **color illustrations** the authors will be expected to make a contribution (€ 485 or US \$ 534, plus 16% VAT per article) towards the extra costs.

11. **Legends** must be short and appended to the text. They should provide a brief, self-sufficient description of each illustration.

12. **Proofreading.** In the interest of rapid publication, the author(s) will receive the page proofs only for the correction of typographical errors. The corrected proofs must be returned within 3 days of receipt. Should extensive alterations be necessary, correction costs may be charged to the author(s).

13. **Fifty offprints** of each contribution are supplied free of charge. If you wish to order additional offprints you must return the order form with the corrected proofs. You are then entitled to receive a pdf file of your article for your own personal use.

14. **Electronic supplementary material.** Data such as black and white or colour illustrations, large tables, animations, video clips, or sound recordings, that are not essential for the understanding of a printed article but yet of interest can be put on Springer-Verlag's server and will be accessible free of charge on the contents site of this journal. Such material has to be submitted in electronic form (see the special instructions that are regularly published in this journal) and will also be reviewed. Reference to this material will be given with the printed article.
